Unlike the *Preliminary Report* released in January 2012, this publication contains statistical tables at the parish and national level derived from the topics included in the census household and person questionnaires. The entire operation of the census covered preparatory work, data collection, data processing and tabulation. The data processing continues and the analytical work is still under way.

On this point, I would like to single out these individuals and express my deepest gratitude to them for opening their doors and giving their time to participate in such an important national endeavour. 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Definitions

Census Day

Census Day was Friday, 27 May, 2011. The objective of the Census was to count all persons present in Antigua and Barbuda at midnight on this day, along with persons whose usual place of residence is Antigua and Barbuda even though they did not spend Census night in the twin island state. Census Day was a reference day while enumeration took place over a period of several weeks following.

De facto Population

Includes all persons present in the country at midnight on Friday 27 May, 2011 Census Day.

De jure Population

Includes persons who usually reside in the country at the time of the census.

Census 2011 took into account the *de facto* and *de jure* populations. Only the *de facto* population was accounted for in previous censuses.

Resident Population

Includes all occupants of private households plus the residents of open and restricted institutions and long-term guests in hotels for 6 months or more.

Enumerated Population

The number of persons for whom a census questionnaire was completed, plus persons recorded in the Visitation Records and for whom a count (*last resort information*) was obtained, but who were not interviewed for various reasons.

Estimated Population

Consists of the enumerated population plus an estimate of the number of persons in households which were not enumerated and for which *last resort information* was not

obtained. The estimate was based on the parish specific correction factor.

Private Households

Consist of one or more persons living together and sharing at least one of the main daily meals together. It excludes residents of institutions and hotel long-term guests.

Dwelling Unit

Any building or separate and independent part of a building in which a person or groups of persons (private households) are living at the time of the census enumeration.

Open Institutions

Group Dwellings whose occupants are free to come and go as they please e.g. hostels, barracks, etc.

Restricted Institutions

Group dwellings whose occupants are unable to come and go as they please e.g. prison, hospital, etc.

Visitation Record

The visitation record is used by census interviewers to record the following during the enumeration exercise:

- Number of Buildings
- Number of Dwelling Units
- Number of Households

No contacts

A term used to describe a variety of events that prevented the completion of questionnaires for a household. e.g refusals, no suitable respondent at home, closed dwelling, inaccessibility to gated areas and refusals

CENSUS 2011 INTRODUCTION

The following section provides a brief and general description of the background to Census 2011. It explains the purpose of the census, describes the questionnaire and the methods used to process and assure data quality.

About Census 2011

A population and housing census is the single most extensive and expensive statistical operation that is undertaken by a national statistical office. It is a snapshot of a country's population at a particular point in time. This point in time is called Census Night.

A census provides a statistical picture of a country and its people. Almost every country in the world conducts a census regularly to collect important social and economic information of its inhabitants.

Censuses are to be taken at regular intervals to produce comparable information in a fixed sequence. A series of censuses makes it possible to appraise the past, accurately describe the present and estimate the future. In Antigua and Barbuda, the census is mandated by the *General Statistics Act, No. 15*

of 1975 and conducted once every ten years.

The last census day was on 28 May 2001.

The Purpose of Census 2011

The primary aim of the 2011 Population and Housing Census (Census 2011) was to collect housing, demographic and social data that would be useful to governmental planners, researchers, regional and international stakeholder institutions to design policies and to appropriately develop plans and programmes.

The census would update and provide a continuous series of quality data on population size, composition and characteristics, housing, and income, essential evidence for economic and social development.

The results of the Census would be used to make many important decisions affecting the individual Antiguan and Barbudan, the communities, and the entire country. Governments, businesses, associations, and community organisations are among the many census data users and critiques. The Census

results would benefit all Antiguans and Barbudans and would be used for the following purposes, among others:

- To plan pensions, health care, housing, and employment programmes;
- To determine where services such as hospitals/health centres, police stations, roads, schools, day-care centres and public transportation, water are needed;
- To provide the data that can help in prioritising and allocating scarce resources;
- To monitor the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs); and
- As a sampling frame for other surveys.

A census also demonstrates the country's commitment to infrastructural development, a necessary indicator for assistance from development partners.

Census Day

Census 2011 referenced Friday, 27 May, 2011 as Census Day. The purpose of Census Day was to have a fixed date for which questions can refer to ensure consistent and comparable responses.

Census Day was also used to arrive at a count of all persons present in Antigua and Barbuda at midnight on this day, along with persons whose usual place of residence is Antigua and Barbuda though they did not spend Census night in the twin island state. This count produced the *de facto* population and the *de jure* population (See Table A).

Census Day was a reference day while enumeration took place over a period of several weeks thereafter.

Scope of the Census

To facilitate the enumeration process, the country was demarcated into discreet

geographical areas. The 6 parishes namely St. John, St. George, St. Peter, St. Phillip, St. Paul, St. Mary and Barbuda were divided up into 8 "parishes" (St John was split into St. John City and St. John Rural), and each demarcated into EDs that were further marked out into blocks, the smallest geographical unit.

Limited data were collected on visitors, crews on board ships in port, inmates of specialised institutions and vagrants. Although the number of persons in these sub-populations is included they are otherwise excluded from the tabulations.

Institutions (Open Institutions):

- Hostels for nurses, teachers, students and others;
- Police barracks and stations;
- Defence Force barracks;

 Hostels/Guest Houses; (accommodation for 6 or more persons) - Long term residents (residing for 6 months or more).

Institutions (Restricted Institutions):

- Mount St. John Medical Centre and Adelin Clinic;
- Clearvue (Psychiatric) Hospital;
- Fiennes Institute and other homes for the aged;
- Her Majesty's Prison and Boys' Training School.

The resulting census data are assigned to seven categories (See Table A). Category #5 - *estimated resident population* will be used for all statistical tables in this report.

Census Organisation and Advocacy

Census Preparation

Census preparation included a mapping and listing exercise, publicity campaign, establishing the NAC and TAC, participating in regional meetings and training workshops.

Mapping and Listing Exercise

The mapping and the listing was a critical activity that preceded the execution of Census 2011. The activity was executed between November 2010 and March 2011.

The objectives of the mapping and listing exercise were:

- To build a database of geospatial information;
- To update all maps for the EDs; and
- To provide a complete and up-to-date listing of all EDs.

Subsequent to this exercise and during the enumeration process it became necessary to divide one ED (ED80100) into 3 EDs that brought the number of EDs to 353, representing an increase of 65 EDs compared to the previous Census in 2001.

Questionnaire Design and Pre- Testing

The regional collaborative effort provided an opportunity for CARICOM Member States to discuss the content of the questionnaires so that there would be a degree of consistency throughout the region. Following this collaboration, the questions were discussed at the NAC and the TAC and then pre-tested. A team in the Census Office then finalised the questionnaire design to meet the needs of Antigua and Barbuda (See page 5 for a description of the questionnaire)

A *hot housing* technique was used to pre-test the questionnaire for clarity and functionality.

A small sample was selected and comprised students at the Antigua State College, ordinary citizens, teachers and members of the Spanish community. Students from the Antigua State College tested the questionnaires on their colleagues; Census Office staff tested the questionnaires on teachers at the Spring Gardens Moravian Church Pre-School and on other staff members of the Statistics Division; and a Spanish speaking person tested the questionnaire on members of the Spanish community.

Comments received from the pre-test informed the scope and content of the final version of the questionnaires.

Publicity Campaign

Publicity for Census 2011 was supported by a variety of stakeholders from the private and public sector. Material included printed, audio and video pieces. Among them, billboards, banners, flyers, bumper stickers, pens, Public Service Announcements (PSA), jingles, a poem, and paraphernalia such as pens, T-shirts, and bags.

As part of the preparatory activities for Census 2011, the Census Office launched a slogan competition that was open to everyone. A subcommittee comprising members of the NAC and the TAC was created to select the winning entry. The winning slogan was *Cooperate*, *Participate*, *make Census 2011 Great*! submitted by Ms. Shameka Joseph of Villa, Antigua.

Billboards and banners to announce and promote the Census were erected at the following sites:

- a banner on Independence Avenue just in time for the Independence Food Fair on 1 November, 2011;
- a billboard on Friar's Hill Road; and
- a billboard at Northsound;

The official launch of Census 2011 was on 24 February, 2011 at the Multi-Purpose Cultural Centre in Perry Bay. The programme was

chaired by the Census Project Manager and the feature address was delivered by the Prime Minister, Hon. Dr. Winston Baldwin Spencer. The Minister of Finance, Hon. Harold Lovell and the Leader of the Opposition, Hon. Gaston Browne¹ were also present. Other head table guests included the Deputy Director, United Nations Population Fund, Dr. Hernado Agudelo, and the CARICOM Statistics Programme Representative, Ms. Barbara Adams. An overview of the Census was delivered by the Chief Statistician.

The private sector also pledged their support for the census. Dr. Errol Samuel, President of the Rotary Club of Antigua spoke about the importance of the Census to the private sector. Mr. Acres Stowe, the then President of the Antigua and Barbuda Employers' Federation was also in attendance.

Among the highlights at the Census launch was the release of the PSA in which the Prime Minister and the Leader of the Opposition, Honourable Lester Bird² encouraged the populace to participate in Census 2011. The production of the PSA was a collaborative effort between the Rotary Club of Antigua and HAMA Inc.

Additional promotional material and events for Census 2011 included:

- The Census Jingle written by Mr. Colin O'Keiffe and sung by Mr. O'Keiffe and his daughter A'Shanté O'Keiffe;
- A poem entitled "Census Cleaning" written and performed by Ms. Angel Cochrane of the McChesney George Secondary School in Barbuda;
- A clock on the Government website designed to countdown the days, hours and minutes to Census Day;

- Timely posting of all material on the Government website;
- Billboards that were placed at strategic places around the country with one in Spanish located in one of the prominent Spanish communities;
- Discussion of the Census on the Spanish Radio Station 88.5 FM;
- Flyers, bumper stickers, pens and informational booklets were placed in banks, businesses, government offices and schools throughout Antigua and Barbuda;
- 50-Days-to-Census Day was marked by the unveiling the first Billboard at North Sound on April 7, which was recorded by ABS TV;
- Other appearances by the Census Office staff on several radio and television stations:
- Staff of the Statistics Division and the Census Office visited the secondary schools to explain the census and to promote its importance as a major national undertaking; and
- Media interviews with Census Office staff

All promotional material was aired on ABS Television and Radio on the days leading up to the Census.

The Census Questionnaire

Census 2011 questionnaire was designed in accordance with the guidelines found in the *United Nations Principles and*

Recommendations for Population and Housing Censuses Revision 2. The 119 questions were the result of consultations with a cross-section of stakeholders who made up the NAC and the TAC.

The questions were grouped into the following sections:

Section 1: Housing

Section 2: Crime

Section 3: International Migration

Section 4: Mortality

Section 5: General Characteristics Section 6: Disability and Health

Section 7: Internet Use

Section 8: Birthplace and Residence

Section 9: Education

Section 10: Training

Section 11: Economic Activity

Section 12: Marital and Union Status

Section 13: Fertility

Section 14: Income and Livelihood

Section 15: Where Spent Census Night

A copy of the Census 2011 household and person questionnaires are included as Appendix IXa and IXb respectively.

The *Identification* section on the front cover of the questionnaire comprised the ED number, the block number, the building number, the dwelling unit number and the household number. A concatenation of the ED number, the Block number and the Household number forms a unique identifier for each household. The household identifier together with the consecutive number assigned to each person uniquely identifies the questionnaire respondent.

Sections 1 to 4 were directed to the head of the household or a responsible member of the household over 15 years of age.

Section 1: Housing

Questions 2 to 25 dealt with the characteristics of the dwelling unit that the household occupied and the facilities associated with the dwelling unit.

Section 2: Crime

For questions 26 to 29, the household occupants responded to questions pertaining to crime. These questions sought to determine whether the occupants were victims of crime within the last 12 months and if so, how the matter was addressed.

Section 3: International Migration

Questions 30 to 39 were directed at persons 15 years and over who may have migrated between 2001 and 2011 and who still lived abroad. The questions captured the individual's occupation at the time when he or she moved, the highest level of education attained when moved, the country to which the person migrated, the year and the reason for migrating.

Section 4: Mortality

The number of persons who died in the household during the past 12 months, their sex, age at death and for females 14 to 19 years the cause of death as it relates to pregnancy and child birth were captured in questions 40 to 42.

Sections 5 to 15 were for each individual member of the household.

Section 5: General Characteristics

The relationship of the individual to the head of the household, his or her sex, age, birth date, ethnicity and religious affiliation were covered in this section. Age and birth dates were avoided by some respondents and recorded as

"don't know/not stated" by the enumerator. Age was defined as "age last birthday". There were 24 options for religious affiliation including "other" and "don't know/not stated".

Section 6: Disability and Health

Questions 50 to 54 dealt with occurrences of disabilities within the household and the origin of the disability whether from birth, illness, accident old age or other. Seventeen chronic illnesses and an "other" option were listed in question 52 from which respondents, if they suffered from any, were able to give multiple answers. Multiple answers were also allowed if respondents had insurance plans. These plans included:

- Social Security
- Life only
- Life and Health
- Group Health
- Individual Health,
- Endowment with Health
- Endowment
- Other

Section 7: Internet Use

Questions 55 and 56 sought to determine the extent of internet use by individuals and where the internet was accessed whether at home, work, school, internet café, cellular phone, other mobile device or family/friends house (fixed line). This section was not included in previous censuses.

Section 8: Birthplace and Residence

There were 15 questions in this section from question 57 to 71.

Birthplace

For persons born in Antigua and Barbuda, enumerators were instructed to record the place of usual residence of the mother rather than the location of the hospital or home where the birth actually occurred.

International and internal migration

Questions 59 and 60 addressed international immigrants and the reason for their present residence in Antigua and Barbuda. Internal migration was captured in questions 65 to 70 and identified persons who had moved within the last 5 years and 10 years and when they came to live in the parish or village where they now reside.

Citizenship

The question of citizenship was addressed in question 71 and respondents could list up to 2 countries of which they are citizens.

Section 9: Education

The questions on education, questions 72 to 76, were asked of all persons. Persons were asked if they currently attended an educational institution and if they were full-time or parttime. Questions on the type of educational institution being attended, the highest level of education attained and the highest examination passed completed the section.

Section 10: Training

This section comprised 7 questions which were directed at persons 15 years and over. Respondents were asked in question 77 if they had received or attempted any skills training or if they were currently receiving any skills training to equip them for employment or an occupation or profession.

The section concluded with questions 82 and 83 which were specific to the type of qualification or certification received upon completion of the training and whether or not the recent training was related to the respondent's current job.

Section 11: Economic Activity

This section comprised 17 questions - question 84 to 100. The questions were only applicable to persons 15 years and older. Three reference

periods from Census Day (27 May, 2011) were used with respect to economic activity:

- the past 12 months (question 84)
- the past week (question 86)
- the past 4 weeks (question 97)

Respondents were asked in question 84 and 86 to indicate:

- if they had a job and worked;
- if they had a job but did not work;
- if they did not work what did they do over the past week;
- and in question 97, did they seek work during the past 4 weeks.

A person was classified as "worked" if he or she was engaged in the production of goods and/or services during most of the reference period and received a wage or salary. These include:

- the paid employee of the Government, statutory body, private business, private home;
- own business with or without paid employees.

The following categories are also included whether or not the worker was paid:

- apprentice or learner;
- contributing family worker;
- volunteer worker.

A person who "had a job but did not work" applied to persons who had a job but spent most of the reference period away from the job.

The options given for persons temporarily absent from his or her job included on vacation, sick leave, study leave, temporary layoff and currently in off season.

A person who "looked for work" spent most of the reference period actively looking for work.

A person who is ready, willing and able to work but who could not find work was categorised as "wanted work and available".

The preceding four categories of persons defined as "worked", "had a job but did not

work", "looked for work", and "wanted work and available" constitute the *economically* active population.

The economically inactive population comprises persons engaged in home duties (for example housewives, others engaged in cooking, cleaning, child rearing but who do not receive monetary pay for these activities), attended school (full-time), retired and disabled.

Persons in these categories, that sought work, were available and willing to work if they were offered a job were included in the economically active population.

Question 89 to 91 addressed persons who owned their own businesses. Questions on the type of accounts that were kept for the business, registration with the Social Security Board and an estimate of the earnings from the business were also asked in this section.

Section 12: Marital and Union Status

There were 4 questions from 101 to 104, directed at persons 15 years of age and older that addressed current legal marital status and present union status.

Section 13: Fertility

Women 15 years and over were asked to answer questions 105 to 110.

Questions 111 to 113 applied only to females under 50 years of age who had a child or children born within the last 12 months (from Census Day 27 May, 2011). Infant mortality was addressed in questions 112 and 113.

Section 14: Income and Livelihood

Paid employees were specifically addressed in question 114 where their income cycle was determined. These respondents were asked to identify their income level from the income flash card Appendix VIII. The enumerators would then enter the income group in the boxes provided on the questionnaire.

Question 116 sought to find out respondents sources of livelihood. Multiple sources could be chosen. Options included:

- Disability benefits
- Employment
- Investment
- Other public assistance
- Pension (local)
- Pension (overseas)
- Remittances (overseas)

- Savings/interest on savings
- Social Security benefits
- Subsistence farming
- Support from friends/relatives overseas (cash or kind)
- Support from friends /relatives local (cash or kind)
- Unemployment benefit
- Other

Recruitment and Training of Census Workers

Application Process

A notice for individuals wishing to work as census field officers was published in the *Daily Observer* newspaper and on the government website in August 2010. Application forms were available from the Statistics Division and on-line.

Nine hundred and seventy one applications were received for liaison officers, supervisors, enumerators and data processors. Each application was given an identification number and the information of each applicant was stored in an electronic database.

Interview and Selection for Training

Members of the NAC and TAC in teams of at least two persons interviewed the applicants. between Wednesday 2 March, 2011 and

concluded in Barbuda on April 15. Successful candidates to be trained as enumerators were informed by a centre page advertisement in the *Daily Observer* newspaper. The liaison officers and supervisors were informed by telephone. A similar listing was placed in the *Daily Observer* notifying individuals who had successfully completed the training process and would become census workers.

Training

Training sessions covered the guidelines for conducting the Census as outlined in the training manuals prepared by the Census Office in collaboration with the CARICOM Secretariat consultant. The training for the supervisors and enumerators was conducted over a period of ten days (See Table B). Individuals were selected for census work based on their attendance at training sessions and their performance in the test as follows:

- two absences were allowed over the 10 day period; and
- a score of 50% or more in the test.

Enumeration Districts

During the decade from 2001 to 2011 there was significant development mainly in the rural areas causing the number of EDs to increase to 353. At the start of the Census 2011 there 63 EDs more than in 2001 due to the splitting of EDs brought about by the mapping and listing exercise. The splitting of the EDs

was done for easy management of the enumeration process such that all enumerators would be allocated a similar number of households, and by extension, liaison officers and supervisors would have comparable workloads. These changes are presented in Table C.

Using ED Maps

To ensure an optimal enumeration of all living quarters on Antigua and Barbuda, enumerators were provided with updated maps of their EDs, created using a Geographical Information System (GIS). A map of each ED was printed and used by each enumerator to locate each household in the district. One ED was allocated to a single enumerator. Where the ED consisted of less than 70 households, an enumerator was assigned additional districts.

In general, an enumerator was limited to 130 households. There were however 5 cases where the enumerator was assigned more than 150 households.

The enumerator was required to mark an X on the map where the enumeration began and

move in a clockwise direction, recording on the visitation record all buildings and dwellings and enumerating each household. Each building was identified and numbered on the ED map. This number should correspond with the listing on the Visitation Record as well as on the Household and Person questionnaires.

The unit of the Census was the individual within a household. The household is found in a dwelling unit located in a block. Several blocks made up the ED. Each individual in the household was given a unique identifier which consisted of 13 digits: the 5 digits of the ED number, the 3 digits of the block number, the 3 digits of the person number. These unique identifiers are critical for data processing, data analysis and for the verification of variables.

Managing the Fieldwork

Census 2011 was different from previous censuses in two ways. Firstly, Census 2011 captured both *de facto* count and *de jure* count, whereas previous censuses captured the *de facto* count only. The *de facto* population includes only persons present in the country on Census Night (See definitions on page xi). Secondly, Census 2011 utilised the post-Census Day enumeration as opposed to pre-Census

Day enumeration as opposed to pre-Census
Day enumeration as was done in the previous
censuses. The enumeration process began on
28 May, 2011, the day after Census Day and
ended officially on 31 January, 2012.

During the post-enumeration period the Mapping Unit of the Census Office continued to verify the mapping information until the scanning was completed in January 2013. During this period, and where possible *last resort information* was collected on dwelling units.

Return of documents to Census Office

Liaison officers were required to return to the Census Office all completed household and personal questionnaires, visitation records, maps, identification cards and any unused material. To organise this return, bankers' boxes were provided along with a copy of transmittal forms: (a) Enumerator to Supervisor, (b) Supervisor to Liaison Officer; and (c) Liaison Officer to Census Office.

Once the box was received by the Census Office each box and its contents were recorded in a register with the enumerator's name, supervisor's name and liaison officer's name. The ED number was written boldly in red on each box so that it could be clearly identified. These were held in an initial holding area. One by one, the boxes were then taken to a checking area where a more in-depth check was made. This check involved ensuring that

the sequence of the questionnaires with respect to the identification of the household – the ED, the block number, the building number, the dwelling number and the household number, and the head of household were the same as that recorded on the visitation record. Additionally, the Mapping Technician checked visitation records against the maps to account for each building. If there was any

visitation records against the maps to account for each building. If there was any discrepancy, the enumerator and/or the supervisor were called in to rectify the situation. In some cases, it was necessary for the ED to be revisited to obtain *last resort information* or to clarify an issue that the Mapping Technician identified.

After these checks were completed, the questionnaires were batched and duplicate batch sheets were placed in each batch. A batch was made up of no more than ten household questionnaires and the associated personal questionnaires.

Once these aspects of the checks were completed, the number on the boxes and the enumerator's name were recorded in a second register and the boxes of questionnaires were then manually edited. The editors' supervisor received the boxes and maintained an electronic status of each box. This system made it easy to know where any box was at a given time.

Treatment of refusals

Just below 2% of households refused to participate in the Census. Although arrangements were made with the Chief Magistrate and the Commissioner of Police to have these household members comply as provided for in the *General Statistics Act*, no legal action was taken. *Last resort information* was however acquired for most of these households and where information on the size of these households could not be ascertained, the correction factor was applied (See page 15 for an explanation).

Data Processing and Data Quality Management

Data processing involves a series of stages with sequenced activities – from training staff to applying statistical techniques to produce good quality data.

Training of Editors, Scanners and Verifiers

Manual editors and verifiers were selected from the database of individuals who had registered with the Census Office at the commencement of the planning phase of the Census. The scanners however were subsequently recruited. All these individuals underwent training conducted by the Deputy Census Officer and the CARICOM Consultant.

Manual editing

The manual editors were required to:

- examine each household questionnaire to ensure the 17-digit identification code was recorded on the cover page;
- examine each person questionnaire to ensure and the unique identifier with the 11-digits was recorded on the cover page;
- ensure that skip patterns were observed by the enumerators; and
- ensure that markings for responses were eligible.

They were also required to pay special attention to question 45 (Sex) and question 47 (Age) in the person section of the questionnaire.

Data capture

The census database was created by scanning each household and person questionnaire. A scanning software, TeleForm, which utilises Optical Mark Reading (OMR) and Intelligent Character Recognition (or Optical Character

Recognition, OCR) was used. The handwritten alpha responses (e.g. occupation, industrial category) were also scanned from the questionnaire and computer-aided coding was used to convert these alpha responses into codes.

Verification

Once the questionnaires were successfully scanned, data verification was done.
Verification is a prerequisite to the electronic editing as it prepares the information from the questionnaires for electronic editing.

Verifiers were required to go through each household and person questionnaire to verify any queries that the computer highlighted. It was at this stage that all text, including professions, industry, country of birth and origin were to be coded using international coding criteria.

Electronic editing

A data editing programme was created to specifically edit the computer database/data file developed for Census 2011. Assistance and expertise was received from two UNFPA-sponsored consultants – Mr. Carlos Ellis and Mrs. Yasmara Pourrier; one CARICOM-sponsored consultant –Mr. Edwin St. Catherine, and Mr. Frank Eelens who was hired by the Census Office.

Handling Data Errors

Population censuses are prone to many types of errors. In general, the errors affecting the quality of the census data are of two types: coverage errors and content errors.

During each stage of the census operation, errors may occur and may distort the final outcome of the census. For example, during the preparatory stage small errors may originate from the questionnaire: inaccurate wording of a question may lead to misinterpretations in the field by the enumerator. Poor quality census maps may confuse enumerators and lead to non-coverage.

During the field work, many types of mistakes may be made: enumerators may forget to visit (or double count) entire households or they may enumerate households that were not assigned to them. During interviews, skips in the questionnaires may be overlooked, questions may be asked in the wrong way leading to incorrect answers, or enumerators may simply forget to record the answer provided.

Census procedures may be poorly explained and create coverage errors in the field.

Coverage Errors

Coverage errors are caused by omissions or duplications of persons (or households) during fieldwork or data handling. There are many causes of coverage errors, including: inaccurate census maps, failure to visit all the households or enumerate all the members of households, refusals by single persons or whole households to cooperate with the census, double scanning or omission of forms during the data entry, and so on.

Content Errors

Content errors occur when the information about a person (or household) is different from the actual characteristics of the person (or household).

As noted before, data for Census 2011 were captured using imaging techniques. Working directly from the electronic images, coding was performed on the screen using international coding lists (ISCO³, ISIC⁴, international country codes). Also during data capture and coding numerous errors and inconsistencies could be introduced.

To limit content and coverage errors, extensive computer editing was used after data capture, to correct the data as much as possible and to impute missing information.

Editing Procedure

During the editing process, the principles and recommendations laid out in the *Handbook on Population and Housing Census Editing*⁵ were followed as much as possible. Editing procedures were divided in three subsequent stages: structural editing, consistency editing and final editing.

Structural Editing

Structure edits ensure that all person and household records fall within their proper enumeration area; that all records are in their proper order; that the proper number of person records are present within each household; and that no duplicate records are present.

In addition to these core structural checks, tests were run to detect errors in the identification fields (ED number, block number, household number, parish and person number). Records that were assigned the wrong identification fields during fieldwork and data capture were manually corrected.

In addition to these checks, many more tests were run to assess the integrity of the data. Values were imputed for age and sex, using *Hot Deck Imputation* techniques. For these techniques, information for an unknown variable is taken from 'donor' records with identical characteristics as the record for which information is unavailable. The hot deck technique is popular in census editing all over the world and produces clean, consistent results.

For each variable for which information was missing, it was decided whether or not dynamic hot deck imputation would be used. In this way, the unknown value is imputed by a likely response.

The imputation criteria depended on the number of missing values and the possibility of biases. Imputations were only performed if they were logically sound and only when the number of missing values was not more than 10 per cent of the applicable cases.

Consistency Editing

During the second stage of the editing, an extensive CSPro⁶-editing program was used to find inconsistencies in the data. For each of the variables in the household and person records it was verified whether the variables had valid values (i.e. information was not outside the allowed data range) and whether variables were internally consistent throughout the dataset.

Internal consistency among *Age, Sex* and *Relationship to Head of the Household* was checked because of their central role. For example, tests were run to ensure that only one head of the household was present; that children of the head of the household were at least 14 years younger than the head; that the total number of persons indicated in the household record was equal to the number of person records, and so on.

In the case where an error was detected, a 'correct' response was derived from related variables of the same record or from other records within the same household. Where no logical 'correct' answer could be derived, the variable was given a 'Not reported/Not stated' value. For a number of variables, 'Not reported/Not stated' values were then imputed using the hot deck procedures.

Final Editing

After consistency editing, a large number of tables were produced using CSPro, to assess the accuracy and consistency of the census information. In these tables some small inconsistencies were identified. These small errors were corrected using the same principles explained above.

In some cases, *cold deck imputations* were used. That is, if a value was missing, it was imputed by a value based on a logical deduction. For instance, if the sex of a person was missing, but questions on fertility were filled in, the sex was assigned 'female'.

Gauging Data Correctness

Although the census is the primary means of collecting population and housing data, information from registers or administrative records can be used as a barometer for the correctness of the census data.

For instance, school enrollment from the Ministry of Education was used to gauge the accuracy of the school attendance population as reported by the Census. The other administrative sources used were the Social Security Board to gauge the number reported as employed and persons who are pensionable; and the Magistrate's Court to gauge the number of births, deaths, marital and union status.

The Electoral Commission's public announcement of the number of voters registered for the 2014 elections was another administrative data source and which was used to gauge the number of persons 18 years and over on one hand, and Antiguan and Barbudan born on the other hand.

Estimating Data Undercount

The last steps in the editing process consisted of the estimation of the census undercount and the calculation of correction factors. This was done using the following methodology:

During Census 2011 some dwelling units could not be enumerated for a variety of reasons

(nobody home, refusal, temporary absent and no suitable person at home). For some of these dwelling units, the number of occupants was estimated using *last resort with count*, while for others *last resort without count* was used.

The Statistics Division is confident that during the census period, all dwelling units in Antigua and Barbuda were covered - either all persons in the household were counted or households were labeled *last resort with count or last resort without count.*

The first step in establishing the undercount in the Census 2011 was a hot deck imputation for the number of persons variable in last resort information without count for households. Then, the imputed number of empty person records was added to the number of these households.

During the structural edit, it was verified that all persons in the household (whether interviewed or not) had a person record in the data file. At the end of this operation, where (and taking into account the *hot deck* imputations) there was a record in the database for every person living in Antigua and Barbuda. Persons with empty records were those that were missed (not counted) during the census.

To avoid producing statistical tables with many "unknowns", the Statistics Division opted

to delete all empty person records from the database and to introduce a correction factor.

Parish specific correction factors were introduced as the coverage of the census was considerably different among parishes. The correction factors were based on the number of empty person records (not enumerated) in the database for each parish.

Table D shows the undercount of Census 2011 by parish and the corresponding correction factors.

Overall, an estimated 6.9 per cent of the population was not enumerated during Census 2011. The coverage of the census was highest in Barbuda, where only 1.5 per cent of persons were not enumerated.

The worst coverage was in St. Philip, where no less than 14.9 per cent of residents were not enumerated. St. John City and St. John Rural, where more than half of the total population resides, had an under-enumeration of 5.1 and 9.5 per cent respectively.

The correction factors were used for all tables in this report that were based on the person records (data from enumerated persons). Decimal rounding may introduce small differences between the row and column totals.

- Training and technical assistance in implementing data processing techniques and data processing procedures.








Figure 1: Population and Housing by Parish




Figure 2: Population Pyramid in Five-Year Age Groups




Figure 3: Population by Five-Year Age Groups




Figure 4: Inter-Censual Change in Population by Parish




Figure 5: Inter-Censual Change in Population by Sex




Figure 6: Number of Households by Land Tenure




Figure 7: Population by Type of Home Ownership of Dwelling Unit




Figure 8: Population by Place of Birth




Figure 9: Foreign Born Population by Reason for Present Residency




Figure 10: Population Under 15 years Old Attending an Educational Institution




Figure 11: Population 15 Years and Older Receiving, Attempted or Have Had Skills Training




Figure 12: Population by Religion




Figure 13: Population by Health Insurance Status




Figure 14: Population 15 Years and Older by Employment Status




Figure 15: Unemployment Rates by Parish




Figure 16: Economically Active Population Aged 15 years and Older by Place of Work




Figure 17: Population by Where Spent Census Night




Figure 18: Population 15 Years and Older by Highest Education Level Attained




Figure 19: Population 15 Years and Older by Highest Education Level Attained by Sex

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
